

## Introduction

This document tells you what qualifications you need to work as a professional driver in the transport sector

Area	Description		
Who is the qualification for?	It designed for candidates to learn, develop and practise the skills required for employment and/or career progression in the transport sector.		
	This qualification covers all the essential skills and knowledge you need for a successful career as professional driver, manager or trainer.		
What does the qualifications cover?	The full syllabus for the Initial qualification and periodic training of professional drivers and social regulations that establish common rules concerning the conditions to be complied with to pursue the occupation of road transport operator		
Is the qualification part of a framework or initiative?	It serves as the core component to the "Entrepreneurship Competence Framework" which aims to establish a bridge between the worlds of education and work.		
What opportunities	It allows candidates to progress into employment or progress from a professional driver into other operational roles such as mentor, trainer, teacher, manager or business start-up.		
for progression are there?	Candidates can access individual units for ongoing Continual Professional Development (CPD) after completing mandatory units.		
	Road safety units can also be delivered to non-drivers and junior members of society as an early year learning project which is supported by our social enterprise initiative.		
Are there any risks?	The road user is the first link in the road safety chain. Whatever the technical measures in place, the effectiveness of a road safety policy depends ultimately on the users' behaviour.		
	For this reason, education, training and enforcement are essential. However, the road safety system also has to take into account human error and inappropriate behaviour and correct it as much as possible — zero risk does not exist.		
	All components, <b>in particular vehicles and infrastructure</b> , should therefore be ' <b>forgiving</b> ', so as to <b>prevent and limit the consequences</b> of these <b>failures</b> for the users, in particular the <b>most vulnerable users</b> .		
	At Drive Time we believe education is the most effective method to reduce risk, not regulation.
